2.0 Section-Sponsored Research and Applications:

Dr. Joseph Losko and Dr. Rona Smeak are the academic advisors and 10 members of the student section participated in a Covid-19 mask and fit-factor research project. **Research Team:** Samuel Miloser, Leah Bracken, Bradley Kane, Alina Schlichtkrull, Benjamin Houk, Alyssa Royer, Nicholas Ravotti, Evan Hilke, Reece Leotta, & David Cuscino.

2.1 COVID-19 Mask Effectiveness:

The purpose of this research project was to identify the fit factor of an N-95 respirator compared to the fit factors of commonly used masks. The research team tested homemade masks, gaiters, surgical masks, and KN95's. Our team used a PortaCount Quantitative Respirator Fit Tester 8038 in order to measure the level of particulates on the inside of the mask versus the level on the outside.

2.2 The research was presented at the Western Pennsylvania Professional Development Conference March 11, 2021. The conference was well-attended by professionals across the area in charge of controlling workplace hazards with various spans of control.

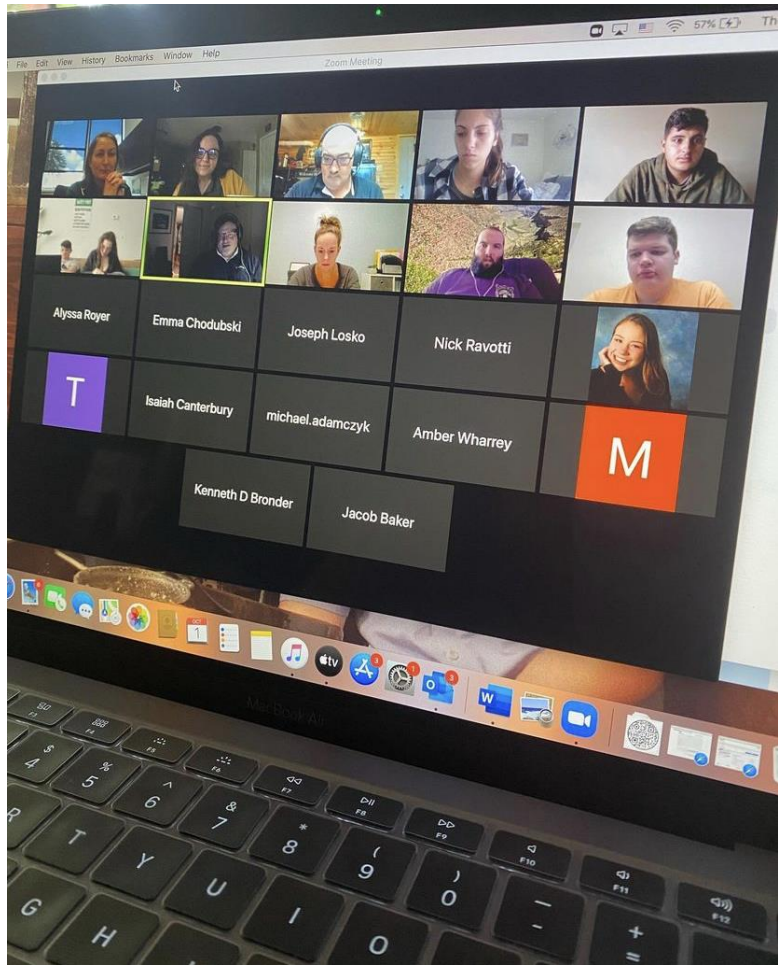

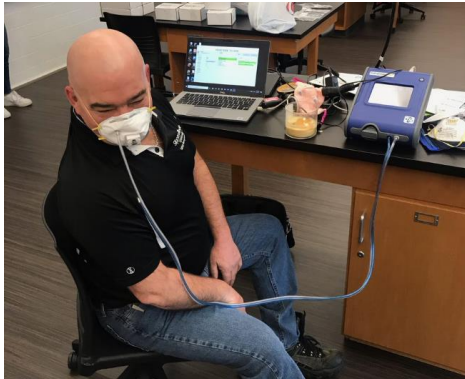

Throughout the course of the ongoing pandemic, there have been varying statements on respirator procedures alongside the use of surgical and homemade masks. Everyday Americans have experienced such a strong culture change that it is quite understandable for the push back and confusion. While some have the belief that an unhealthy person should not have to wear a mask, others believe everyone should have to in the case of asymptomatic individuals. Due to this topic being so recent there is plenty of cause for these issues being handled differently. Between the CDC, WHO, OSHA, and the direction of the White House staff, the fight against COVID-19 has been a trying battle.

N95 Respirators

N-95 respirators are designed to create a seal around the mouth and nose of the individual



wearing it. “An N95 respirator is a respiratory protective device designed to achieve a very close facial fit and very efficient filtration of airborne particles” (FDA). These masks are not very accessible to the public and are commonly used by professionals within the medical field.

What Masks Should be Worn

When it comes to what type of mask the general public should be wearing, the leading health experts have laid out a list. According to John Hopkins Medicine, gaiters,



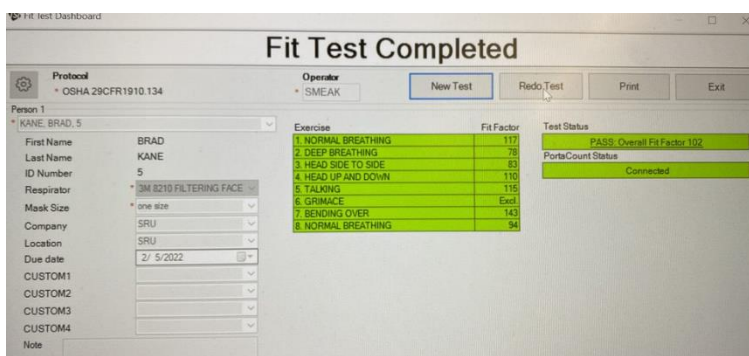
bandanas, and any mask with

valves do not work as well as a traditional face mask. They go as far as to inform their patients that they will not be provided service. When dealing with COVID-19, American citizens have worn all types of masks to do their part in stopping the spread. Hopkins Medicine also does not recommend face shields as there is an opening at the bottom of them (Hopkins). However, the CDC says it is acceptable to wear a face shield when wearing a face covering is not a viable solution. They recommend a face shield that wraps around your face and covers below the chin (Mayo).

The evidence from these leading hospitals and testing centers have come together on the conclusion that cloth face masks are the best defense in stopping the spread of COVID-19.

1 person vs 2 people

At the beginning of this pandemic, which feels never ending, there was a lot of information sent out to the world; because COVID-19 is a new virus strain, much of the information communicated was from speculation. In the early stages of the virus, the advising



experts said that there is no need to

wear a mask. Some had the stance that it would be beneficial if only one person wore a mask, while others felt that the prevention of the virus would be more effective if all parties wore a mask. Since the information given to the public has changed several times, it has caused conflicting opinions, confusion, and disbelief about the effectiveness of masks.

For the past eleven months, there has been extensive research and testing done by doctors and scientists which has helped us learn more about COVID-19. Based on the results of this research, the CDC and WHO now recommends cloth masks for the general public, however in the beginning phases, they recommended just the opposite. Experts did not know the extent to which COVID could spread in these early stages, however, research now indicates that everyone should wear a mask in addition to practicing social distancing and other preventative measures. While there is still much more to learn about this virus, we know more now than when it started. According to the CDC and health experts, properly wearing a mask protects yourself and others, therefore, masks work best when everyone wears one. Research and testing have concluded that masks, along with taking other preventative measures, does help stop the spread of the virus.

NIOSH, CDC, WHO, OSHA, and Dr. Fauci

Now we can look at some of the views organizations and individuals have during this pandemic. As per NIOSH, N-95 filtering respirators should be worn by someone clean shaven



and disposed after

each use (KQED). The respirator will lose its static electricity seal if not used in this manner.

The Center for Disease Control and Prevention recommends communities wear face masks to prevent the spread of Covid-19. Also, the World Health Organization advises the use of masks to limit the threat of Covid-19. The Occupational Safety and Health Administration has stated that COVID-19 can be a recordable illness if a worker is infected as a result of performing their work-related duties. OSHA recommends that workers wear cloth face coverings to reduce the spread of the current pandemic. Dr. Anthony Fauci has been encouraging everyone to wear a face mask as well. “We need to show a degree of consistency of everybody following public-health recommendations on wearing masks or other face coverings”, said Dr. Fauci. He is imploring that people wear the masks consistently and correctly through the Covid-19 Pandemic. By looking at all these views we can start to see the trend of how important wearing a mask is in these trying times.
