3.1 Section-sponsored community activities

1. Kentucky Trophy Deer Hunt Raffle

The 2nd annual Deer Hunt Raffle ticket selling started in August and will extend through May. Members of the fundraising committee met to make posters and call local shop owners to allow ticket sells. Every member was required to sell/buy one ticket which gave motivation to spread the word! 2. Golf Outing

It started with an idea to involve students with a golf scramble, and turned in to a large fundraiser. Companies that frequently recruit at Murray State University for professional safety internships and full time positions donated money for their company to be represented at a hole on the Murray Country Club. While this event won't take place until May, preparation for students and officers to work together to keep scoring and assist golfers by volunteering as caddies for a cause has spanned the entire semester.

3.2 Section-sponsored campus activities

1. Aluminum can drive

Student section members implemented recycling stations into Murray State University's Occupational Safety and Health Department. Every ASSE meeting and information session held within the department provides both food and beverages. With the new recycling stations, all aluminum cans (and plastic bottles) can be conveniently recycled by students, community members, and businesses that attend. Pop tabs are also collected for the St. Jude Children's Research Hospital.

3.3 Section participation in community activities:

1. Trail of Treats

This event was created to allow for a safe environment for children and families on Halloween night. The event was held in the local park where businesses, organizations, and groups set up booths representing themselves as well as handing out candy and goodies to kids. The ASSE student section volunteered at a booth decked out in PPE and handed out flyers with tips for a safe and fun Halloween night along with candy. **See Appendix F**

Eight Student Section members helped to teach local elementary through high school students the importance of safety in industry by aiding them through exercises which highlighted the difficulties experienced by those with disabilities. **See Appendix F**

Locally, Habitat for Humanity is an organization that helps build houses for those in need of a home. The residents then pay the organization back whenever possible. Six ASSE students aided this cause on Saturdays throughout the semester by painting and do other construction like duties to help finish the project.

7. Certifications

Murray State University's Occupational Safety and Health Department is proud to be ABET accredited. As a part of our course curriculum all students are required to take OSH 387—OSHA Standards for General Industry and Construction. In addition, those students choosing to take the Occupational Safety and Health Track are required to take OSH 384—Construction Safety. With successful completion of these courses making a C or above and receiving approved attendance rates, students will receive

a **30 Hour General Industry Certification** and a **30 Hour Construction Certification** respectively. This semester alone 105 students took OSH 387 on Murray State's Main Campus and 70 students took OSH 384.

Getting Involved: Study Abroad





Bylaws for Murray State University Student Section of the Purchase Area Chapter

Bylaws Adopted: March 16, 2015

Student Section Chartered 1978

ARTICLE I - NAME

- Section 1. The name of this Section shall be the Murray State University Section of the Purchase Area Chapter, American Society of Safety Engineers.
- Section 2. Hereinafter, the Murray State University Student Section shall be referred to as the <u>Section</u>, the American Society of Safety Engineers shall be referred to as the <u>Society</u>. The Purchase Area Chapter shall be referred to as the <u>Chapter</u>, the Regional Operating Committee shall be referred to as the <u>ROC</u>, and Murray State University shall be referred to as the <u>University</u>.

ARTICLE II - PURPOSES

- Section 1. The purposes of this Section shall be to promote the advancement of the safety profession and safety education and to foster the professional well-being and development of its members within its campus and community.
- Section 2. In fulfilling its purposes, the Section shall have the following objectives:

 a) To further the professional preparation of the members by sponsoring programs for the advancement of safety and acquisition of technical knowledge.
 - To improve scholarship and the general quality of work in the Safety Profession by fostering a concern for progress in all areas of safety, among safety educators and practitioners.
 - To encourage greater professional and social cooperation and interaction among students of safety and allied fields and disciplines.

- To unite the resources and skills of students and faculty in programs to benefit Section members, the university and its community.
- To assist the Society in the development of effective and relevant educational programs for the preparation of future safety professionals
- To provide encouragement and support to society student activities and foster student member development and retention on its local campus.
- To promote participation and entrance into safety/health careers by high school and college students.

NOTE: Other specific objectives may be added here

Section 3. Nothing in these Bylaws is intended to substitute for, or supersede, rules or procedures established by the university that impact upon the Student Section.

ARTICLE III - MEMBERSHIP

- Section 1. Section membership is open to all Student Members of the Society, who are enrolled in the safety or related curricula at the university. To be eligible as a Society Student Member, an individual shall be enrolled in an accredited undergraduate or graduate degree course intended to prepare the individual for practice in the safety profession or one of its relevant specialties, shall pay an annual renewal fee as designated by the Society Board of Directors, and shall declare in writing the intention to enter the Safety Profession upon graduation.
- Section 2. Student Member status may be retained up to one year following graduation, or until the individual is employed in the field of safety, whichever comes first.
- Section 3. Section membership is personal and non-transferable and in order to be a Section member, dues must be current.
- Section 4. Section membership may be terminated after non-payment of dues, upon proper notice, or by majority vote of Section members upon recommendation of the Executive Committee, based on conduct deemed harmful to the reputation or functions of the Section.
- Section 5. Section members are eligible to vote on all matters brought before them. A majority affirmative vote is necessary for action unless otherwise specified in these Bylaws. On Chapter and Society issues, Student Members are eligible to vote only on the election of officers.

ARTICLE IV - ORGANIZATION

- Section 1. The Section is a subdivision of the Chapter, formed and operated by ASSE Student Members attending an educational institution located within the Chapter's geographical area.
- Section 2. The Section shall have and maintain a minimum of ten (10) members in order to maintain its charter
- Section 3. In order to maintain its charter, the Section shall identify an advisor (defined in Article V, Sec. 3) and shall provide the Chapter and Society annually with information on the advisor's name, address and telephone number.
- Section 4. Formation and maintenance of the Section charter is based on requirements and guidelines set forth in the <u>Chapter Administration Guide</u>, and is subject to the approval of the Chapter and the appropriate ROC.
- Section 5. The Section may be dissolved by the Chapter and/or the ROC, if such action is deemed to be in the best interests of the Chapter and Society. Voluntary dissolution of the Section shall be by two-thirds of Section members after a 30-day advance written notice by the Section Executive Committee. Voluntary dissolution is subject to the approval of the Chapter and AOC (ROC). Upon dissolution, all Section funds and assets shall be returned to the Chapter, university, ASSE Foundation or other ASSE entity, depending on the funding source.
- Section 6. The Section fiscal year shall begin on July 1 and end June 30. The Section activity year shall begin on May 1 and end April 30.

ARTICLE V - OFFICERS

Section 1. Elected Section officers shall be:

- a) President
- b) Executive Vice-President
- c) Vice President
- d) Secretary
- e) Treasurer
- f) Recorder

Section 2. Duties of officers:

a) The President (Chairperson) shall call, set agendas for, and preside at meetings of the Executive Committee, and preside and set agendas for meetings of the Section membership; shall set goals and objectives for the Section and provide leadership, guidance and direction to officers, committees and members to see that they are mot, shall appoint members of the Nominating Committee; shall serve as chief spokesman and representative of the Section to the Chapter, Society and allied groups; and shall submit an annual report of Section activities to the Chapter and Society,

- b) The Executive Vice President shall succeed to the office of the President if the President is unable to serve; shall act for the President when requested to do so by the Executive Committee or members; and shall perform duties as requested by the President.
- c) The Vice President shall assist the Executive Vice-President and President and shall be in charge of Section projects and/or committees as requested by the President and shall report on project/committee progress to the President.
- d) The Secretary shall record, transcribe and distribute minutes of all Section meetings, prepare and distribute meeting notices, maintain all Section records and conduct Section membership development, retention activities, and communication under the supervision of the Executive Committee.
- e) The Treasurer shall collect and disburse all Section funds, maintain Section financial records including all income and expense activities, collect Section-generated membership fees and dues, handle all Section flaison with financial institutions, submit an annual report of all Section financial activities to the Executive Committee, and keep the Section and Chapter regularly informed as to the Section's financial status.
- The Recorder shall collect pictures and accounts of all Section activities for the purpose of writing and submitting the Outstanding Student Section Award petition for the Section.

Section 3. There shall be a Section advisor who shall be either:

- a) An ASSE member who is a faculty member of the university or
- A formally designated member of the Chapter in whose geographical area the Student Section's university is located.

The advisor shall be an ex-officio member of the Section Executive Committee, and shall serve as liaison between the Section, appropriate university officials, and the Chapter. The advisor shall approve Section activity and financial reports, fundraising activities, and be consulted on all matters relating to Section dues, fees and Bylaws. The advisor shall ensure that Section activities do not violate University rules and regulations governing on-camous clubs, groups and activities and Murray State University Guide for Student Organization Advisors shall be adhered to.

c) The advisor will be selected by the Chair of the Occupational Safety and Health Department in consultation with the Section Executive Committee.

ARTICLE VI - COMMITTEES

- Section 1. Elected Section officers and the Section advisor shall make up the Executive Committee, which shall govern the Section according to these Bylaws and within the authority delegated to it by Section members.
- Section 2. The Section shall have an Officers Committee which will be composed of the elected officers and the advisor(s) for the purpose of developing a state of Section officers annually for member election. They shall be charged with assuring that the best interests of the members is considered.
- Section 3. Other Section committees may be appointed by the Section President as appropriate, and led by the Executive Committee.

ARTICLE VII - NOMINATION, ELECTION AND REMOVAL OF OFFICERS

- The Nominating Committee shall be the Officers Committee and the President will serve as the Nominating Committee Chairperson or may appoint a chairperson.
- Section 2. The term of service for officers shall be for one year beginning May 1.
- Section 3. Individuals wishing to be considered for an office will submit a nominating petition, on the approved form, signed by any 7 Section members. The petition shall be accompanied by a written acceptance by the nominee(s) and shall be submitted to the Nominating Committee Chairperson no less than fifteen (15) days before the election is conducted.
- Section 4. The Section Advisor shall present the incoming Executive Officer Committee to the Section members at the March meeting.
- Section 5. All Section members shall be given the opportunity to vote on the election of officers, through written beliefs distributed on campus and/or at a Section meeting.

- Section 6. Any officer, elected or appointed, if they miss four pre-designated executive, special or regular maetings shall be subject to dismissal and replacement by majority vote of the Officers Committee. Elected Section officers may be removed by majority vote of Section members at any regular or special meeting upon presentation of a signed petition from the Section Executive Committee or 15 Section members. Notification of such meeting shall be made to all members at least ten (10) days in advance of the meeting. Appointed Section officers may be removed by the Section Officers Committee.
- Section 7. Vacancies in elected Section offices occurring during the elected term shall be filled by majority vote of the Officers Committee designated in Art. Vt. Vacancies may be filled by moving existing officers to new positions or by appointing a new individual. The Section members will be notified of the change at the next regularly scheduled meeting. When considering how to fill vacancies, the committee shall be charged with assuring that the best interests of the members and the Section is considered.

ARTICLE VIII - DUES AND FINANCES

- Section 1. Section members shall be assessed an annual student member renewal fee by the Society as determined by its Board of Directors. In addition, applicants for Student Membership may be assessed membership application fees as determined by the same Board. Fees shall be paid annually on the anniversary of the Student Member's election date.
- Section 2. The Section may assess its members additional annual fees and dues, as set by the Section Executive Committee.
- Section 3. The Section Executive Committee, through the Section Treasurer, is responsible for all Section financial activities, under guidelines established by the Society, Chapter, these Bylaws, and the Section Executive Committee.
- Section 4. The Section shall provide an annual financial report to the Chapter, Regional Operating Committee and Society, describing all Section income and expense activities for the preceding twelve (12) months. This report shall be reviewed and signed by the Section Advisor and submitted to the Chapter by July 15.

ARTICLE IX - MEETINGS

- Section 1. The Section Executive Committee shall meet upon the call of the President or upon a majority vote of its members.
- Section 2. The Section shall hold at least two (2) meetings of its members annually, to acquaint them with its activities and conduct necessary

- business. One-tenth of the Section members at a meeting shall constitute a quorum.
- Section 3. Special meetings of Section members may be called by the Section Executive Committee or by written potition of fifteen (15) members, submitted to the Section President.
- Section 4. Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised shall govern the transactions of business at Section meetings, unless otherwise specified in these Bylaws

ARTICLE X - AMENDMENTS

- Section 1. Amendments to these Bylaws may be proposed by the Section Executive Committee or by written petition of at least fifteen (15) members. Amendments proposed by members shall be presented to the Section Executive Committee.
- Section 2. Amendments shall be published at least fifteen (15) days in advance of the meeting at which action will be taken on them.
- Section 3. Amendments shall be voted on at a regular or special Section meeting where a quorum is present. A majority two-thirds affirmative vote is required for approval.
- Section 4. All amendments approved by Section members are subject to approval of the Chapter Executive Committee and Regional Vice President.

The study is to investigate a 24-hour time weighted average noise exposure for U.S. Navy sailors aboard the U.S.S Ronald Reagan Aircraft Carrier. The methods include students spending weeks at a time aboard the naval ship using 3M The Edge Eg 5 Noise Dosimeters and 3M Sound Level Meters to conduct noise exposure surveys. Significant Noise Exposure to Sailors in US Navy Shipyards

Abstract

United States nuclear-powered aircraft carriers have a highly structured schedule that involves recurring periods of training, deployment, and maintenance. Noise-induced hearing loss (NIHL) is a significant problem among Sailors aboard these carriers due to the nature of ongoing shipboard operations and extended periods of exposure. This study aims to characterize Sailors' exposure to noise during all phases of carrier activity; in this phase of the study, noise exposures were collected during the carrier's maintenance period. Over half of the collected samples showed overexposure during relatively short time periods. Rehabilitation work involving the use of needle-guns was a significant contributor to the excessive noise doses. As maintenance work is scheduled months in advance of actual operations, the Navy's safety team should become involved in the scheduling of operations with potentially significant noise exposures to protect Sailors from overexposure and NIHL.

Global Thirst for Safety

PURPOSE

To compare the bourbon industry in Kentucky and the wine-making industry in Argentina to determine the similarities and differences in safety practices and the ways safety is regulated.

LEARNING OBJECTIVES

The objective was to compare safety practices in distilleries in Louisville, Kentucky, and vineyards in Mendoza, Argentina. Through this it was hoped that there might be some exchange between practices in the two countries with the possibility of providing a program of safety management for the vineyards in Argentina.

ABSTRACT

A comparative study is being undertaken that is examining the safety practices in the bourbon industry in Kentucky and the wine industry in Argentina. The bourbon industry in Kentucky, which dates back to the first steam distillery being created in 1815, is now a \$3 billion industry, employing over 15,400 jobs. Overseen by the Kentucky Distillers' Association, it is a highly regulated industry that has numerous safety practices in place. By contrast, while they have been drinking wine in Argentina for many centuries, it is only more recently that Argentina has become one of the world's largest exporters of wine. Indeed, Argentina is the world's fifth producer of wine by volume, following France, Italy, Spain, and the United States. It hopes to increase its production and become a serious international competitor with large scale industry and modern methods. Therefore, we will be examining a very important industry within this country that employs many people, all of whom must be kept safe in the workplace.

Unfortunately, Argentinian safety practices lag behind as present wineries are expanding and new wineries are cropping up. Argentina has yet to develop standardized and enforced safety practices in their distilleries. To help meet this need, the Occupational Safety and Health

Department at Murray State University, under the leadership of Dr. Gary Morris, began developing a study during the fall semester of 2014 that first would look at safety practices in the bourbon industry of Kentucky and, during the January term of 2015, would travel to Mendoza, Argentina to visit a number of vineyards. Seven OSH students accompanied Dr. Morris on local visits both in Kentucky and in Argentina. In Kentucky, the students were able to observe the many safety hazards associated with the bourbon industry along with the safety regulations that were put in place. With this background in mind, they were able to see which safety practices were carried out in Argentina and which were not. It was noted that the Argentinian wine industry needs to develop well defined safety practices.

METHODS

The methodology included becoming familiar with the literature already available on safety practices in distilleries and hands-on visits to distilleries in Kentucky and vineyards in Mendoza, Argentina, as well as interviews with workers.

CONTENT

The final project will include a detailed summary of findings, which also will include photographs, and recommendations.

RESULTS

In the United States we identify, evaluate, and control possible hazards; whereas, in Argentina, this is not being done. A hazard is only realized at the vineyards in Argentina after an accident occurs. If a person gets injured, they avoid doing the same thing instead of fixing the problem. They control awareness by putting up signs related to a small number of potential hazards, not by changing the methods by which work is done. There is a strong need for safety regulations to be put in place in vineyards in Argentina.

CONCLUSIONS

Workers are at risk of accidents and injuries in vineyards. As Argentina continues to expand and compete globally with its wine-making industry, it must take seriously developing and enforcing practices that will keep workers safe from accidents and injuries. Safety regulations need to be developed and put in place so that hazards can be identified, evaluated, and controlled to prevent employees from getting hurt.

Streamed Television on Electronic Devices

Abstract

Streaming television is becoming increasingly popular, especially among college students. We compared three different categories: the amount of time spent watching streamed television, the type of electronic device used, and the position in which you are in the most, to the level of discomfort experienced. We conducted a survey among the students of Murray State University and received 182 completed surveys. We ran an ANOVA: Single factor statistical analysis and found that, 80% of the total variability is explained by the type of the electronic device used. Our data showed that the strongest correlation was between type of electronic device used and level of discomfort.


Tablet Project


As safety increases and technology broadens, many are looking for ways to develop and create new devices to make the job more effective and efficient. We would like to help safety professionals maintain, analyze, and evaluate safety constraints through a tablet device. The device used in our study will consist of many applications to determine qualitative and quantitative safety measures, make trainings and safety meetings more effective, and create more efficient audit templates. Doing this will give safety professionals access to a multitude of information while increasing the ability to stay organized.

The study was initiated by an AECOM, a Fortune 500 construction company, with the goal of finding more uses for android tablets in safety training environments. The assignment was presented to the ASSE student section at Murray State University, and a team to head the project was developed. The tablet team conducted research on visual and interactive training aids, developed software applications for use in android devices, and worked in unison with a major software developing company on creating interactive safety training games. The project started as a simple task but thanks to the creativity and ingenuity of the ASSE student section it has now evolved into a research and development intensive assignment that could ignite a new era in safety training. The project is still on going and will be passed on to next year's Student Section to further research and conduct detailed studies on the use of interactive training software in tablet devices. They hope to publish an article in the Professional Safety Journal with their results.
