Strengthening connection, belonging and professional identity

ASSP strengthened member loyalty and engagement by focusing intentionally on the quality of everyday touchpoints and opportunities for connection. These efforts deepened relationships across the Society and reinforced ASSP's role as a professional home for safety practitioners at every career stage.



Our 2025 Member Needs Assessment shows that member loyalty has reached an all-time high! Our Net Promoter Score (NPS) surged to a record +61, officially placing ASSP in the "Excellent" category for satisfaction.

Education, Skills & Professional Growth

Delivering relevant, high-impact learning for a changing profession

ASSP delivered education and professional development designed to help safety professionals meet emerging challenges and advance their careers—through in-person events, digital learning, publications and new credentials.

Highlights

- > Safety 2025 in Orlando welcomed more than 6,000 professional attendees and nearly 700 exhibitors
- > SafetyFOCUS served more than 225 EHS professionals across 250+ courses
- > Launched new credentials and programs, including the Robotics Educator Safety Awareness Certificate Program
- > Professional Safety Journal remained the #1-rated ASSP member benefit, publishing 82 peer-reviewed and practitioner-focused articles
- > 25 **The Case for Safety** podcasts, bringing conversations with workplace safety experts across industries.
- > Hosted 70 community webinars, engaging 4,775 registrants



Workforce Development & Foundation Impact

Investing in people and the future of the profession

Building a strong, sustainable safety profession remained a priority. Through workforce development initiatives and the work of the ASSP Foundation, ASSP expanded awareness of safety careers, supported professional growth and reduced barriers to education.

Highlights

- > Engaged more than 5,000 school counselors at the American School Counselors Association national conference, representing nearly 2 million students
- > Piloted the Safety as a Career Resource Kit to introduce safety as a profession
- > Supported more than 150 EHS professionals through free career coaching
- > Awarded \$300,000 in scholarships and grants
- > Supported nine families who were affected by a workplace tragedy
- > Recognized more than 4,500 donors
- > Celebrated the largest gift in ASSP history: \$325,000 from BCSP

Standards & Professional Practice Leadership


Advancing consensus standards and modern EHS practice

ASSP continued to lead the development and continuous improvement of industry consensus standards that promote safe work environments, improve productivity and drive continuous improvement.

Highlights

- > ASSP launched Safety Trekr AI™, its first product-based AI tool, delivering expert guidance drawn from the Safety Professionals Handbook in a new, accessible way
- > Worked to move safety beyond compliance to a strategic business driver
- > Built the framework for Standards-Based User Groups (SBUGs)
- > Secured the first technology partner to integrate Z10/Z16/45001 standards

Advocacy & Strategic Partnerships

Influencing policy and amplifying the voice of safety

ASSP conducted sustained and strategic advocacy to strengthen the federal occupational safety and health infrastructure, elevate evidence-based policy and advance modern occupational EHS practices that protect workers and support the safety profession.

Highlights

- > **Influenced National Heat Safety Policy:** Helped shape OSHA's proposed heat standard by elevating practitioner- and standards-based prevention approaches.
- > **Positioned EHS as Business Value:** Co-launched the Core Principles of Modern EHS Practices, with nearly 100 organizations expressing support and/or endorsement (public and private), reframing EHS as essential to workforce well-being and performance.
- > **Strengthened Federal Partnerships:** Reinforced ASSP's role as a trusted advisor through active participation in OSHA Alliance Forums and Construction Roundtables.
- > **Protected Federal Safety Capacity:** Advocated for sustained funding for OSHA, MSHA and NIOSH to support prevention, research and safety data systems.
- > **Preserved Critical NIOSH Programs:** Contributed to reinstating key NIOSH functions, including Health Hazard Evaluations and PPE and respiratory health programs.
- > **Expanded Strategic Safety Partnerships:** Formalized new MOUs with SAIA and CSRA to advance construction safety and research-to-practice solutions.
- > **Unified the Safety Community:** Including convening, coordination and facilitation across diverse partner organizations to advance alignment on modern EHS practices.
- > **Defended Safety Data and Workforce Development:** Supported protections for Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) safety data, independent oversight and federal workforce development priorities.
